

Each year, the Association of Assistant Principals (AAP) gives out its coveted **Martin Safran Citizenship Awards** to 15 students (in grades K-8) who have demonstrated exemplary service in their schools and/or communities. The winners, and their AAP-member assistant principals, are celebrated at a special event in June, during which students receive a beautiful award and \$100. At the same event, three graduating high school students, whose parents are AAP members, receive \$1,000 **Stewart Weiner Scholarships**, based on merit. Winners will be notified in May.
